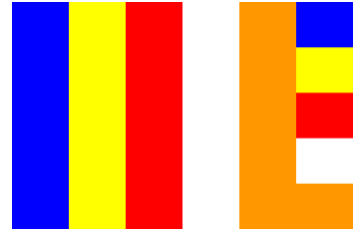




Building Better Learners: A-Level Religious Studies Buddhism - Mr Tighe

- 'It is right that Buddhist monks and nuns have more rules to follow.' Evaluate this view.
