Specification Content: The development of key Buddhist traditions in Japan - Zen, Pure Land and Nichiren, with particular reference to the central practices of koan (paradoxical statement used as a practice in Zen traditions), nembutsu (going for refuge in Amida/Amitabha Buddha in Pure Land traditions), and daimoku (mantra used in Nichiren traditions).

20-Mark Questions:

- Explain/examine the distinctive features of Zen Buddhism.
- Explain/examine the distinctive features of Pure Land Buddhism.
- Explain/examine the distinctive features of Nichiren Buddhism.
- Explain/examine the role of koan in Zen Buddhism.
- Explain/examine the role of nembutsu in Pure Land Buddhism.
- Explain/examine the role of daimoku in Nichiren Buddhism.
- Compare the practices of Zen, Pure Land, and Nichiren Buddhism.

30-Mark Questions:

- 'Japanese Buddhism is a particularly unique form of Buddhism.' Evaluate this view.
- 'Japanese Buddhism represents a radical departure from traditional Buddhism.' Evaluate this view.
- 'There is little that connects Japanese Buddhism to the rest of Buddhism.' Evaluate this view.
- 'There is so much that unites Zen, Pure Land, and Nichiren Buddhism.' Evaluate this view.
- 'Zen, Pure Land, and Nichiren Buddhism have little in common with one another.' Evaluate this view.
- 'Koan, nembutsu, and daimoku are far removed from conventional Buddhist teaching.' Evaluate this view.
- 'Koan, nembutsu, and daimoku give expression to important Buddhist teachings.' Evaluate this view.
